Chairman's Corner by Tony Simons

Numbers for some organised activities have been low this season for a variety of reasons, hopefully participation level will recover in the next few weeks.

Weed update:

My thanks to all who have been weed clearing to make boating possible, many hands make this possible.

All lakes in and around Oxfordshire suffer from weeds of various types making any form of boating difficult from June onwards our lake being no exception. The weed has been slow off the mark but is now making its presence known partly consisting of blanket weed but more dominant at the moment is an aquatic weed that is easy to cut compared to the blanket weed.

I have researched how to control aquatic weeds this can be summed up as regular cutting, total removal of roots in the autumn, weed killer, depriving of light, realistically our only option is regular cutting to this end more focus is being aimed at improving the tools we have. A commercial weed cutter is the dream machine but sadly is beyond us to financially to buy, build or hire.

The area in front of the jack-up platform seems to not only grow weed but is a gathering place for loose weed that has probably been cut by ski boat propellors it is easy to remove with a rake I have recently purchased the components to make a lighter rake with a longer reach handle.

One of the rescue boats has been attached to the weed cutting

platform I will bring the second rescue boat to site in early July, a cover will be available for the weed cutting boat to prevent rain and leaves entering but the means of attachment has yet to be invented. Also, I would appreciate some help to add at least two more cubes to the weed cutting platform to increase the buoyancy plus further strengthening of the whole assembly.

I have adapted a hedge cutting tool as a trial for cutting weed this will be powered by a 24 volt motor, some form of weed collecting tray/forks to be fitted to the weed cutter platform to speed collection of cut and floating weed hopefully regular cutting will make boating less prone to weed issues.

Recently but seemingly in decline an algae bloom blocked light penetration into the water this slows weed growth considerably, algae blooms are cyclic, but the lake normally seems to have two blooms/year with extended periods when the water is clear.

Site tidiness:

Part of the deal with our landlord is keeping the area we use tidy my thanks to members who have been doing this and emptying the trailer, nature is starting to overtake a little, I will add garden shears to our repertoire to cope with nettles and hedges.

Jack-up Platform problems:

I have noted the beam along the shore side of the platform has deformed beneath the position the access ramp rests on the platform, until I can straighten and reinforce this area, please don't have more than three persons on the platform at any one-time.

After setting up we decided to walk around the boating lake. It's a fairly good size and could accommodate all the boats, although it did get a bit bumpy at times and you had to watch out for the buzzy hovercrafts, which took full advantage of the calm weather.

It was free sailing most of the time with two events – one for IC boats and one for club 500s. We watched the IC boat display and we both took part in the Club 500 race. The race wasn't that serious – my boat had an unexpected hole in it so took on water and stopped working when the receiver got wet. Leo did much better and came third against some fast competition.




This motor, esc and programming card was bought to power an Aero Kits Patrol Boat.




An early spring wind up motor from Meccano in working order has brake & reversing levers. + assorted Meccano gears & pulleys




Historical electrics when dynamos ruled
